AEI Affiliates

Affiliated unions managed to close deals with several employers, both for union representation and for improved Collective Bargaining Agreements. To mention one of the big achievements, our American affiliate, AMFA, are now representing AMEs in Canada. Engineers in one airline/MRO after the other have choosen a craft specific union as their representative, which is very positive!

Many affliates also negotiated new CBAs during 2024. Due to the lack of competent technical staff, many affiliates managed to improve salaries and other benefits. This in order to maintain staff and to attract new people to joing the industry.

The workforce (lack of competent staff) has been the number one topic 2024, as it was in 2023, and we have probably not seen the worst consequences of this issue yet.

EASA and **FAA**

New EASA regulations on training content and licensing (Part-66) have been introduced. AEI was represented in the rulemaking group by Geir Eriksen, our Technical Affairs Committee Chairman. His input was instrumental in the way it contributed to the end result. The President of AEI, Ola Blomqvist took part in another rulemaking group, dealing with regulations for Maintenance Training Organisations (Part-147). This is still in progress and we are expecting a final opinion to be sent to the EU Commission for decision during 2025.

Our American affiliate, AMFA supported the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA) final rule on Drug and Alcohol Testing of Certificated Repair Station Employees Located Outside the United States under CFR 14 Part 120. This measure represents a significant
